

Dynamic Grace in Motion




In my previous career as a project manager, the joke was that my job was like the old vaudeville act where the person spins a series of plates on poles and must visit each plate to give it a further spin so that none of the plates fall off its stick. The secret to success, whether managing projects or spinning plates, is to keep all the important elements in motion. One could say this is a true phenomenon in nature, but it is also an observation about how God seems to work through the Church.

A congregation cannot focus on just one ministry. A congregation does not flourish on good preaching alone. A congregation doesn't thrive on compassionate pastoral care alone, or friendly members alone, or generous self-giving outreach alone. Focus on each individual's growth is essential, but focus on self-development distorts a church unless the self-development is also tied to service to others. Study becomes academic without being paired with worship. All these elements -- worship, outreach, prayer, faith formation, pastoral care, resource management -- when engaged together lead to a growing, lively church, full of people who are following in the footsteps of Jesus.

Of course, this means keeping all the plates spinning. The Holy Spirit is very good at keeping all the plates spinning, helping a church stay gospel-oriented and flexible enough to adapt itself to people's circumstances on the ground. But this also means that we never "crack the code" of how church best works. We never find the perfect worship schedule for all time, the ideal commission structure, or the dream approach for funding ministries. As soon as we find "perfect," we stop "spinning", or changing and responding to the Spirit, and when we stop responding to the Spirit, we die.

While it is true that change can be fatiguing, motion is needed to keep moving: God's will is to keep the plates spinning. So the next time you see us updating something at the church, or revising a program or developing a new ministry, rejoice that the plates are still spinning. If you don't know everything that's going on, or if you need to be introduced to someone you don't know, rejoice that the plates are still spinning. If the financial needs of the congregation increase, rejoice that we are finding new ways to touch people with Christ's love and invite them into the service of God's kingdom. The timeless ministry of Christ remains effective while the church is willing to adapt to the eras of particular times and cultures in which the church finds itself.

From the Assistant Rector

As most of you know, my family has faced something that no one wants to face, but it is something that many of you have. Maggie, my wife and the most wonderful person I have and will ever know, was diagnosed with breast cancer on the eve of Christmas Eve. She then endured what many of our parishioners have, a double mastectomy, on the eve of New Year's Eve.

After the confusion, anger, and sadness that follows any event such as this I preached a rather rambling sermon to let you all know what had happened in our family. There is a very simple reason that I did this. The first reason is a little self serving- we clergy can get incredibly upset when

we find out about catastrophic events after the fact. So, knowing this and with the incredibly wise counsel of the wisest priest I have ever met (Shirley, your Rector), I decided to let you know what was happening with our family in the most open forum that I could imagine. That forum was, and is, the pulpit at St. Martin's Episcopal Church. I did this with incredible trepidation. The pulpit is, in my mind, to speak about the Gospel and Jesus Christ.

After the rambling sermon, I realized that my words were indeed not about Maggie, me, Liam or Finn, but about the good news of family and the openness of family. I realized this because upon later reflection I came to understand that the sermon was not about us, but about the hard bumps in the road that we all lift each other up from.

I must admit that I only realized this after the sermon was over.

This was because at the end of the services, I received the love and support of a parish that made me know that our relationship was not a one way street. Our relationship is not one in which I support you and received no support in return- but one of family that love and support each other. In other words, y'all love us as we love you.

In other words, y'all have all taught us more than any three years of seminary could. We are eternally grateful for a lesson that will form our family for the rest of our days.



Outreach Update

Saint Martin's strives to be one of the limbs of the Body of Christ in this world and I am very happy to say that this is evident through our many efforts in outreach!

In the last fiscal year, you as parishioners have-

- Donated over 500 bags of groceries to FISH at a value of roughly \$16,000
- Prepared and served over 475 meals at the Grove Christian Outreach Center and delivered donated groceries on a weekly basis.
- Fed over 225 meals to homeless persons in Newport News in partnership with St. Paul's Episcopal Church.
- Distributed approximately \$55,000 in financial assistance to international, national, and local individuals and organizations (operating and restricted funds combined), excluding our contribution to the Diocese of Southern Virginia, which was an additional \$48,000
- Volunteers lend their talents to organizations such as Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Avalon, FISH, Walk the Talk Prison Ministries, The Community Resource Center, and the Community of Faith Mission.
- The parish has sent a mission trip to Minot, North Dakota to volunteer over 300 hours to aid residents devastated by flooding.
- Members continue the tradition of our annual Christmas gift drive for the kids of James River Elementary School and providing thanksgiving meals to the precariously housed and homeless of the Williamsburg area
- Parishioners worked over 596 volunteer hours by staffing the Winter Shelter homeless shelter program in conjunction with the Community of Faith Mission.

We are growing in our efforts and continue to strive towards the goal that is emblazoned on our pulpit- "That we would see Jesus"

CALENDARS & CARDS RECYCLING PROJECT

In the fall of 2009, Ann Meyer and I were looking for a way to do something constructive with the calendars that filled the mailboxes of the Bruton and St. Martin's parishioners, rather than putting them on the curb with the newspaper & magazines to be recycled. I asked a friend, whose uncle was at Envoy Williamsburg, if she thought the residents and staff might be able to use some wall calendars and she immediately said yes! She gave me the name of the Activities Director and we were off and running. Just before Thanksgiving Ann & I delivered several hundred 2010 wall calendars, Christmas cards and even wall hangings to brighten the rooms of the 130 residents and the staff at Envoy.

The next fall the calendars and Christmas cards came pouring in. So we added Avalon, Grove Christian Outreach, and Olde Towne Medical Center. We also learned that Erase the Need could use the pads of paper and pens and that Grove could use all occasion cards all year. Each year the numbers collected and distributed increased.

This year, thanks to the Activities Department at Williamsburg Landing, residents were able to drop off calendars and cards. With three groups of people "recycling" together the response was overwhelming! We were able to distribute calendars and cards to four more organizations.

The organizations are: Avalon, Child Development Resources (CDR). Envoy Williamsburg, Erase the Need, Family Preservation Services, Inc. in Hampton, Grove Christian Outreach, Olde Towne Medical Center, Sanders Retirement Village in Gloucester and Woodhaven at Williamsburg Landing.

The totals are: 1045 calendars and 3414 cards, of which 2121 were Christmas cards. 390 of the Christmas cards came in the week before Christmas. Those will be delivered to the Liz Moore Military Team next September as they begin collecting cards to send the troops overseas, so that they can send them to family and friends back home.

Senior Pastoral Care

One of the founding principles I love about Saint Martin's is our outreach and conviction that we are all part of the body of Christ. Our pulpit bears the words "We would see Jesus". Our priests bid us to evangelize by example, so that others

may know that we are Christians by our outward signs of love and compassion.

So what do we do when our hearts are willing; yet our hands, feet and stamina have become unable to comply with our mission, when we become the recipient of Saint Martin's care, instead of the doer of good that we have always been? What is our ministry as we age?

Faith, prayer, and humility are the basis of our work for Christ. These are powers that bolster any faith community. A daily prayer for Saint Martin's and the work we have been given to do, is a way of blessing and safeguarding our outreach workers. Praying for the sick, brings loving healing. Making a daily safety call to an elderly friend brings an assurance of connectedness and caring. The work of Christ is quiet and without media fanfare or political affiliation.

As we age, humility may take a different slant. Being care-receivers, is also a gift to give back to the parish that so wants to help others. This being said, it is often very difficult to ask for continuing help, without feeling like a burden. After all, everyone has very busy lives and very little extra time, and people have a hard time saying no to a person in need. So all too often, we don't ask and struggle on the best we can.

How difficult it must have been for the disciples to let Jesus wash their feet and minister to them. In ancient times it would have been considered rude to not offer a traveler off the dusty roads a basin to wash his feet, and respite from the journey. Today it might be considered rude to not honor and care for our elders and give them respite on the journey. But to accept someone's offer, to see your calloused, twisted feet, or other age-related ailments, is truly taking faith, prayer and receiving, to a state of true humility. It is here that the grace of God appears. Jesus loves us and works through us at all stages of our lives. "Such as my love has been for

you, so must your love be for each other. This is how all will know you as my disciples: by your love for one another" (see John 13, 34-35). Jesus knew it was hard to receive, but He knew that we were connected as the body of Christ, caring and receiving each other's care.

Saint Martin's Senior Pastoral care is working with Faith in Action to help people examine what needs they may have and providing information to help people age safely in their homes, with some added supports. Information is also available for support groups for care-givers, by calling either Saint Martin's or Faith in Action.



hot meal. The difference in this project and a standard meal service is that we will all break bread together as a congregation and a community. We have seen the relationships that have been made and testified to in our congregation members who have participated in the Community of Faith Mission Winter Shelters, so we thought- why only once a year?

With this in mind, we will reach out the local social services agencies, the neighborhood schools, and neighborhood churches to invite people to simply come by and sit down to a potluck meal at Saint Martin's. For this project to work, there is one essential ingredient. That ingredient is not a spice or a dish —the most important thing is YOU. This is simply because building relationships is the way we live into our call as Christians and there is no better way to build relationships in a community than by sharing meals!

So, bring a side dish, drink, or dessert to Miles Hall on February 26th at 6pm; an entree, side, dessert on March 26th, or April 30th at 6pm and reach out in hospitality to those in need- and be prepared to see the face of Christ in each other!

Growing, Together and Supporting Each Other

We can grow and support each other by meeting together regularly in a small group setting.

It's no accident that Jesus found the model of 12 friends gathered together to be an effective way of helping them grow and enabling them to touch others. Twelve people meeting together is a small enough group for everyone to get to share, ask their questions and make bonds of friendship with each other. It's also big enough to prevent any one person from feeling too self-conscious.

In the Fall of 2013, with the vestry's encouragement, I launched St. Martin's Home Fellowship Groups. In the next few months, we will grow from two groups to five groups, and more will be developed as people express the desire to be involved in a group. Each group meets weekly for an initial period of weeks to get to know each other. Then

the group decides on an ongoing schedule that will work for their members. At each session, the group follows the format of opening prayer, check-in, study / sharing, prayer requests, closing prayer and refreshments.

Each group consists of a host and a facilitator who have been in one of my training groups and learned how to support a healthy group. I will periodically visit the group as a way of keeping pastoral contact. My hope is that, eventually, we will have a Home Fellowship Group in every area of our community to support the growth and pastoral care of members beyond what happens on Sunday mrirning. In addition, I would want groups to feel free to invite their neighbors so that even those who do not worship at St. Martin's may benefit.

What Home Fellowship Group is

- Individuals who are willing to grow individually and together
- People who yearn for an assurance of Christ's caring for them in their daily lives
- Folks who let others share appropriately, without cross-talk, advice-giving or judgment.
- A balance of prayer, personal sharing and Christian study (often the Bible but sometimes a devotional or contemporary Christian thinker).
- A non-threatening environment
- Coordinated and resourced by Rev'd Shirley
- Initially, groups will meet weekly for six weeks, and then members can decide whether to continue. You may move between groups.
- Each group has a host, facilitator, and a point of contact.
- Each group has 8-12 people to enable a good group dynamic and an opportunity for all to share.

What Home Fellowship Group is not

- A self-help group
- A counseling or therapy session
- A Bible study (only), even though study is a component of every session
- A mentoring group

What do I do if I'm interested in a Home Fellowship Group?

- Look at the list of groups and find one that meets on a day/time that works for your schedule.
- Call or email the point of contact for the group and find out if there's room in the group.
- If there is room, go! If there's not, try another group.
- If you can't find a group that still has openings, contact Rev'd Shirley so that she can know of growth needs.

ST. MARTIN'S FINANCIAL REPORT DECEMBER, 2013

December provided a very strong finish as it has in the last two years, enabling us to finish the year with revenues substantially ahead of expenses. The statements below are probably confusing. I apologize, but the problem stems from the budget containing \$22,800 in revenue from "From Restricted Funds", which was never needed, and has distorted revenue and Net Total for the entire year. The key to understanding 2013 is actual cash income and actual cash expenses, summarized in the underlined statement in NET/NET below.

REVENUES

Revenues were over budget for the month by \$47,054 (\$48,954 if you disregard the From Restricted Funds budget of \$1,900 per month, which we did not touch all year). As a result, the annual revenues were \$16,864 over the published budget. HOWEVER, actual revenues were over the real budgeted income (without the From Restricted Funds entry) for the year by \$39,666. For the year, Pledges were over budget by \$9,044 and Non-Pledge Contributions were over by \$31,877.

EXPENSES

Expenses were over budget by \$5,419 for the month as we caught up on some last minute expenditures. YTD expenses were under budget by \$3,390.

NET/NET

For the year, 2013, St. Martin's had real income of \$717,158 and real expenses of \$699,292...leaving us with a surplus of \$17,866. On the I&E statement, you will see a surplus of \$20,254, which is larger than the stated surplus of \$17,866, because, even with the anticipated addition of \$22,800 From Restricted Funds, the budget anticipated that we would have negative cash flow of \$2,388.

PREPARING FOR 2014

In the last vestry meeting, the vestry approved the 2014 expense budget and postponed action on the budgeted income until we had more data and more analyses. We are accumulating that information and expect to deliver actionable information prior to the February meeting.

Vestry Report November 2013

A quick review of the activities of the Vestry reveal several important themes.

- St. Martin's, as is the case with other mainline Protestant churches, is undergoing a significant transformation in its membership and lay leadership. Sadly, the World War II Generation, the Silent Generation (those born in the 1930s and early 1940s) and some "Baby Boomers" (1946 to mid-1960s) are rapidly moving on to their ultimate rewards and will no longer be with us on earth. Our ministers have presided over twenty funerals this year. As a result, the current active membership must match the courage, compassion and commitment of earlier generations. This will obviously require a willingness to lead and contribute.
- Fortunately, as evident by the five new volunteers for the Vestry, our members are responding to the challenges for leadership. At the same time, we need to thank Geoff Wade for his superb leadership as Senior Warden this year, who along with the thoughtful and constructive contributions of Bill Hoover, Nancy Pierce and Barbette Spaeth, will be completing their three year terms on the Vestry.
- St. Martin's as of this date is also meeting the monetary challenge needed to sustain out missions. National studies show that it takes five new members to equal the contributions of one older member who has passed from the scene. Fortunately, this does not appear to be the case at St. Martin's. With the skillful leadership of Ron Monarch, as Treasurer, we have a good picture of the actual expenditures for next year and can budget accordingly.
- Of course, ordinary and exceptional expenditures are always with us. Our Junior Warden, Rene de Jager, along with Cliff Dickey who is also on the Vestry and many others, have, as all members will undoubtedly notice, done a virtual transformation of our buildings and grounds with minimum expenditures.
- The original DNA of St. Martin's is its commitment to outreach. Based on the truism that any organization needs to respond to new challenges to flourish, the Outreach Commission has announced four major activities and goals for 2014. (a) The continuation of the Winter Shelter Program at the church for the week of January 26-February 2. (b.) A Parish/Neighborhood potluck dinner pilot program starting in February. (c.) A program of forums with guest speakers known as the Parish Practical Theology Forums on a number of issues such as aging, mental health, pollution and violence. (d.) Last but certainly not least, St. Martin's will continue its financial support for community service organizations.
- Can not close without expressing the greatest admiration for the fifteen years of tremendous service of David Benedict in the numerous missions for the well being of this community.

Hopefully, this has been informative without being verbose.

St. Martin's Episcopal Church Vestry Report for December

- Vestry retreat is at the end of January. All current and new members are encouraged to attend.
- Thanked everyone for service on vestry, esp. Renee and Ron
- Geoff thanked by vestry for his leadership

- Wood siding on the side of the Zig-Zag Building has been replaced in time for Christmas.
- Termite treatment planned around sanctuary when weather is warmer


