Waves of Gratitude

A wise person once told me that feelings come and go, like waves lapping the ocean's shore. We are like the sandy beach: we receive each wave that comes in, and we're still there when the wave goes back out to the ocean's depths. It's good to let these feelings come and go. Trouble comes when we start judging these feelings as bad, telling ourselves that we shouldn't feel sad, or angry; that we shouldn't feel fearful; that we shouldn't feel happy; that we shouldn't feel grateful. Instead, it's important to let the feelings come and go.

This message is important in two ways as it pertains to having a grateful heart and giving of oneself to this church community – in time, talent and treasure. First, it's important to let the feelings of gratitude wash over us and nourish us. Just like our bodies need the restorative properties of water, so our spirits need the restorative properties of gratitude. We can be grateful that today we have the strength to live; grateful that we walk

into the doors of St. Martin's and people genuinely care about us; grateful for God's unconditional love for us; grateful to be in community with others who are not content to leave people who struggle economically behind in the dust. We can be grateful that there's a larger Episcopal Church which let us borrow clergy who work on the bishop's staff to stretch our own clergy resources, a larger Church that helps us with questions of insurance and how to fairly compensate our employees. We can be grateful for the children who make our 80- and 90- year olds giggle in church and our 80- and 90-year olds who demonstrate to our children that life can be lived courageously.

When we allow our spirits to be nourished by these waves of gratitude, we ourselves feel capable of giving what God has shared with us. And when we give, we experience the power that comes of being agents who are capable of action: capable of making sure endangered women and their children have toilet paper and cleaning materials at the Avalon shelter; capable of providing financially for this church so that ministries can continue to happen; capable of contributing your prayers to this holy place so that even a stranger entering its doors can recognize that this church is soaked in prayer and hope and love.

Just as you're being invited this fall to feel grateful and pledge to give financially to support St. Martin's ministries, you may, however, experience feelings other than gratitude. Other waves, also, might wash over you, waves like frustration, anxiety or even shame. Sometimes people get frustrated that the church asks for money. It may feel like another request for limited resources. That's a natural feeling: let it come and let it go. As you think about how generous you'd like to be to provide for ministry, you may feel anxious about not being able to fund all the priorities in your life as much as you'd like: let that feeling come and let it go. And, alternately, you may find yourself getting fed up with all the calls on the resources God has shared with you, and you might choose to simplify and do without some things so that you can more fully invest in other things. Let the feelings come and go, and then exercise decision-making that's in line with your values and what's important to you and who you are as a member of this community of St. Martin's Church.

From the Assistant Rector

During this time of stewardship and giving of ourselves to the Glory of God, being that we are the Hands and Heart of Christ in this world-I thought it would be a good time to let you, the Body of Christ, know the impact that you have had on the lives of those who need our help.

St. Martin's was founded with a strong ethos of being a part of the community. We have grown as our community has grown. When growth is encountered in a community, the needs of the community grow as well. The figures below represent a sketch of not only cash donations that you as St. Martin's Episcopal Church have expended, but also the volunteer work hours that have grown this community. These numbers also represent the

value of the goods donated to those in need in our community. We are a blessed Church who continues to be a blessing to our friends in need.

- At years end will have donated approximately 500 bags of groceries to FISH with a value of approximately \$5000.00
- Implemented the new Neighbor + Neighbor meals program joins those in need to parishioners fostering a sense of community with those who volunteer, provide food, and attend.
- **Community Health Forum,** the program that focused on advocacy, crisis intervention, and recovery issues for the Williamsburg area had 80 attendees and representatives from many different social service and non-profit agencies.
- We have **fed over 225 meals to the homeless in Newport News** in partnership with St. Paul's Episcopal Church with a value of \$1,125.00
- **Distributed over \$17,000** in financial assistance to international, national and local individuals and organizations so far this fiscal year.
- Many individuals have taken on ministries in partnership with other organizations such as **Big Brothers and Big**Sisters, Avalon, FISH, Walk the Talk Prison Ministries.
- Christmas Angel Program that has delivered gifts to the disadvantaged youth of the Grove area.
- 596 volunteer hours involved with the **Winter Shelter** last December this accounted for \$5,960 of impact to the local community. We are ready to do it again this winter!

The impact of Saint Martin's is not one of only treasure donated to local non-profits, after all the United Way and the Community Foundation specialize in distributing significant funds to the non-profits that fill the gaps of care in our community, but we give of our selves, our souls, and our bodies, all to the Glory of God.

We will continue meet Christ by building a relationship with those in need, as well as donate significant funds to the organizations that we partner.

This year, our proposed budget will designate \$9,000 to be donated to area non-profit organizations, \$5,000 to go to those individuals from the community who are in need of emergency assistance. We, for the first time, will designate \$2,000 for the internal outreach ministries (those ministries that impact our community and are unique to Saint Martin's). These ministries will include Neighbor + Neighbor, The Winter Shelter for FY 15, St. Paul's homeless program, The Community Health Forum, and other ministries as they might arise.

Newly Appointed -- Associate Rector

The vestry and I are delighted to announce an improvement in response to a long-term desire of this congregation: to be a church that is supported by two seasoned full-time clergy. The model we've operated under in the past has been to have an experienced rector and a newly ordained assistant rector. However, with the growth of our congregation (both in terms of size and the complexity of its needs), we have come to realize that the congregation's desire is to make relationships with two clergy that can be sustained over the long-haul.

It was our hope, when Clay Riley was hired three years ago, that he would grow in experience and skill such that, about the time we as a congregation were able to offer a more senior position, he would be able to fulfill it. At its September meeting, the vestry affirmed my decision to offer Clay the permanent associate rector position, newly converted from the assistant position. He has accepted our offer, and as a result, Clay will work more independently and with more authority in the areas he has already been supporting: Outreach, Faith Formation, Ecumenical Relations, and administration of the licensure process for Lay Eucharistic Ministers, Eucharistic Visitors and Lectors in addition to the routine clergy duties of preaching, designing worship, leading worship, pastoral care, bereavement care, spiritual direction, teaching, weddings and funerals as well as diocesan ministry responsibilities.

We are fortunate indeed to welcome Clay into this newly converted position.

All Saints Service- 7am Nov. 1st, 2014

"For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

This beautiful reading from the Revelation to Saint John reminds us of the mercy and love God has for us here and now, as well as the love for those Saints who have passed before us. Saint Martin's will acknowledge that love and the gift of the lives of those parishioners and loved ones who have joined the Communion of Saints and found their place at the heavenly banquet table when we **celebrate the Feast of All Saints at 7am on Saturday, November 1**st in the Memorial Garden. During this solemn service we will acknowledge the love for those who have died in the past year, as well as those loved ones who have moved past our sight with the celebration of Holy Eucharist and prayerful recitation of those saints whom we lift up to God on this day, which celebrates the eternal life given to us, and those who died, by our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Service of Repentance for the Sin of Racism—Nov. 1st 5pm

Annual Council Resolution R-1 resolved that "November 2, 2014, All Souls Day will be designated as the 'Day of Repentance and Reconciliation' in the Diocese of Southern Virginia and parishes will annually hold this observance during the octave of All Saints." The spirit of reconciliation and repentance for the sin of racism will be prayerfully honored at Saint Martin's Episcopal Church in Wil-

liamsburg on **November 1st at 5pm** as we acknowledge our transgressions of the past and repent for those sins against our brothers and sisters in Christ that we have committed as an institution and as individuals. The service will conclude with the celebrating of Holy Eucharist where we will acknowledge our reconciliation with Christ, as well as the entirety of the Body of Christ. The evening will then conclude with a meal of thanksgiving that will acknowledge the gift of reconciliation that God so bountifully provides to us. Children's Worship Aids

We have added to our repertoire of quiet

On that rack are small colored material bags containing a manipulative toy, a tract explaining what we do in our services, and a small book of pictures from famous painters. Below the rack and bags is a box with stuffed lambs in it that can also be taken into church. There is a book in the same box that goes with the stuffed lamb entitled "Let us Pray." In addition to the coloring pages and crayons on the narthex table is a graphic novel by Earnest Graham entitled "The Unlikely Chosen" which could be enjoyed by a child that reads. You are encouraged to make use of all of these worship aids, but unlike the coloring pages, the material bags, lambs and book, and the graphic novel should be returned to their original place so that children from other services can use them too. When Christmas Is Hard, Come for Strength

Even a good and fulfilling life is interrupted by tragedy. When one of these tragedies involves the death of a close relation or friend, we may encounter cycles of grief that come back around to us at holiday times. Getting extra support in a non-intrusive way can be a helpful way to get through the holidays.

In general, it's good to participate in the community life in a way that feels manageable to you. Don't isolate yourself, but participate in something where there aren't a lot of expectations put on you. For example, you might sign up to provide Thanksgiving food for families in hardship. Or you might make a habit of going to the Saturday evening eucharist service at 5 p.m. instead of the Sunday morning service. Or you might come to the Thursday, Contemplative Prayer session to get steadied spiritually.



In addition, two methods of support are available specifically in anticipation of Christmas for people dealing with grief: our **Blue Christmas Service on Saturday**, **Dec. 13**, at 5 p.m. and our booklet on surviving the holidays.

Our Blue Christmas service is a beautiful Eucharistic service with readings from scripture as well as other inspirational resources and provides an opportunity specifically to give thanks for and remember our loved ones. In preparation for this service, a live Christmas tree will be outside the church in the portico for you to place an ornament with a picture of your loved one, starting Nov. 30th, the first Sunday of Advent. This is a way of gently including those we love but see no longer. Feel free to bring friends or neighbors to this service. We will make sure to help them feel welcome and included.

In addition, I hope you will pick up a surviving the holidays booklet from the narthex (entryway of the church). The booklets should be available starting Nov. 30th.

Don't Cheat Yourself: Celebrate Advent as well as Christmas

Each one has special meaning and adds depth to your experience of Christmas. During the four Sundays of Advent, the readings from Holy Scriptures and the music explore themes of honesty, justice, mercy, and the hunger for hope. We frankly acknowledge the places where God's seeming absence creates the desire in us to have Christ be visible in our midst.

Then, choose one of more ways to celebrate Christmas with us.

On Christmas Eve, Dec. 24, there are three services:

4 p.m. Christmas Pageant with Holy Eucharist

7:30 p.m. Traditional Christmas Eucharist with Choir and String Ensemble 10:30 p.m. Music Sing-Along with Celtic Christmas Eucharist at 11 p.m.

Usually, there's plenty of room at the 7:30 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. services, but we plan to offer overflow seating in Miles Hall as a way of preparing for Easter, when our crowds are much bigger. So, feel free to invite your friends, family and neighbors to join us for Christmas as we look to expand our capacity. "Overflow" will be made possible by the special gifts of parishioners who are enabling us to stream announcements to the new TV display that's to be installed in the narthex (entryway) and stream the service from video camera in the sanctuary to simultaneous projection in Miles Hall. Anyone seated in Miles Hall during the service will be invited by the ushers into the church for the distribution of Holy Communion.

In addition, on **Christmas Day (Thursday)**, **at 10 a.m.**, we offer a simple and cheerful Holy Eucharist in thanksgiving for the Christ Child come among us.

Community Café WMBG

Our first Community Café WMBG, held at St. Martin's Episcopal Church on September 4, was very successful with over 75 people attending. The idea to create an interfaith community for those of us who are over 60, or caregivers of parents over 60, began this past summer. The following churches participated in organizing the event: Ascension of Our Lord Byzantine Catholic Church, Bruton Parish Episcopal Church, Hickory Neck Episcopal Church, King of Glory Lutheran Church, St. Bede's Roman Catholic Church, St. Martin's

Episcopal Church, and St. Stephen Lutheran Church. Also supporting the Café through advertising and attendance, were: Unitarian Universalists, Williamsburg Baptist Church, Williamsburg Community Chapel, and Williamsburg United Methodist Church. The Faith Task Force began under the auspices of the Senior Services Coalition, in an effort to inform the public about services in the Williamsburg area, and to provide a venue for fun and fellowship.

The September Café Topic was "Physical Well- Being". The Senior Services Coalition arranged for several volunteer experts to form the panel. Nancy Rivolta, Director of Memory Care with Comfort Keepers, addressed the topic of brain health. Heather Cordasco, Fitness Consultant, spoke about maintaining health and balance through physical exercises, and Sonja Mitchell, Family and Consumer Sciences Agent, Virginia Cooperative Extension, described healthy foods and nutrition needs as we age. The panel answered questions and provided resource tables for further information on the topics. After the short presentation, the Windsor Winds, a group of musicians from WindsorMeade, led a nostalgic sing-a long. The afternoon was filled with information, fun and fellowship.



EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

a program of the University of the South

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a distance learning program offered to lay people by the School of Theology at the University of the South in Sewanee, TN. St. Martin's is offering this program begin ning in January on Thursday evenings from 6 to 8pm in the Choir Room. Due to this time frame,

participants bring their own bag dinner and beverage. Seminar members systematically go through the Old Testament, New Testament, Church History and Theology over a four month period. The group begins on Thursday, January 8 and breaks for Christmas and Easter; however, registration must be completed before the end of November in order for the class materials to arrive on time. Seminar members also experience something called theological reflection. This is an exceptionally useful tool to employ when faced with an unusual situation or when needing to make a difficult decision. The method trains one to reflect on the pros and cons of a solution in comparison to Biblical examples and reflection on the thoughts and feelings of the Biblical personalities in the example. The result of such an exercise is always illuminating. If you are a person with more questions about faith and God than you have answers, then this course is for you. The awakening of members to their own spirituality and a better understanding of individual ministry are but two of the glowing outcomes of this course. - -Families will be needed to deliver the meals to the families (in the Wiliamsburg area).






