We Need You

It may surprise you to realize that God has chosen to rely on us to do the continuing ministry of Jesus, and that this includes financing the church's operations. St. Martin's Church receives no government income, despite the services we provide for the poor, the elderly, and those who are ill. We receive no income from retirement communities, even though we provide pastoral care and sometimes social worker services and lead prayer services. We receive no income from the larger church, even though the ministry of the bishop and his staff is available to educate us and provide pastoral care to clergy as needed. We do receive a small percentage of income from building rentals, under 5% of our total budget, but that figure is low because we consider building use as outreach to needful community services like Co-Op Preschool, AA, the Association of Retarded Citizens and the Girl Scouts. We cut our costs hugely by relying on volunteers to do much of what other churches have paid staff to do. But for the rest, for the vast 90% of our budget, we need you, to make a pledge and to contribute money toward that pledge throughout the year so that St. Martin's can continue to provide the "headquarters" to support all the amazing ministry that happens at our church and throughout the Williamsburg community.

During the week of October 20, you will be receiving in your mailbox an inviting appeal, asking you to prayerfully consider what you will pledge to St. Martin's Church for the calendar year 2014. We hope you will quickly fill this card out, or pledge online. On November 10, we will give thanks for all the pledges received as well as celebrate the Feast of St. Martin of Tours, whose moment of seeing Christ in the beggar's face continues to inspire us. Your prompt response is essential since, on November 21, our vestry (governing board) will discuss the 2014 budget, and on Dec. 12, we will pass a budget. We adopt a budget based on received pledges for the coming year, so if you're hoping that something you like now will be continued in the future -- or hoping that we will be able to do something we were not able to finance in 2013 -- please pledge promptly.

Two years ago, the vestry (St. Martin's governing board) decided to lead by adopting a year-long process of engaging and educating the congregation for stewardship in addition to running the yearly Annual Giving Appeal in October-November of each year. Studies of congregational health show that, in the long-term, the year 'round approach to stewardship education is more successful in contemporary culture than any other approach. What is "success"? Helping more people feel that their faith matters, they have a significant relationship with their church and that they are hands-on in their faith through prayer, formation, and acts of ministry and financial giving.

We're thrilled to announce our program of year 'round stewardship as "Grateful, Glad and Giving Gatherings" or 4G.

These gatherings are integrated into our Faith Formation schedule, so that the 4G always follows "Story Sunday," the 10 a.m. Sunday session that kicks off the theme in Sunday School for the next several weeks. Diocesan Service of Repentance, Reconciliation & Healing

November 2, 2013 at 11:00 a.m. At Christ & St. Luke's, Norfolk

On February 16, our Annual Council passed a resolution acknowledging that the sin of racism continues to negatively affect the mission of our parishes in Southern Virginia. The resolution also called for a Day of Repentance, Reconciliation & Healing - a day in which our diocesan family can gather together in worship - and that parishes will annually observe a Day of Repentance, Reconciliation & Healing during the octave of All Saints. The service is intended to be a liturgical moment in an ongoing process of learning.

Repairers of the Breach

November 12, 2013 at St. Martin's

At Annual Council in February this year, The Repairers of the Breach Task Force offered a resolution to set aside November 2-3 of each year to encourage parishes in the Diocese of Southern to observe a Day of Repentance. The adopted resolution will be observed at St. Martin's on Tuesday, November 12, 2013 at 7pm.

A short video produced by the Repairers will be shown. A history of what Bishop Hollerith referred to as "the sin of racism" in the diocese and in particular in the Williamsburg area will be traced. When St. Martin's began, during the height of the Civil Rights Movement, its leadership decided to welcome persons from the entire Williamsburg community and to make outreach an important priority. The program will continue with participatory exercises—all designed to create a more beloved community.



Baptism anyone?

Like most Episcopal Church's, St. Martin's offers baptism on the appointed days of the year: the Sunday after All Saints Day (usually the first Sunday of November), the first Sunday of January (Holy Name), the Saturday evening before Easter Sunday (Easter Vigil) and Pentecost (50 days after Easter). However, we are also happy to schedule a baptism at other times when a baptismal candidates godparents, grandparents and/or family members are able to attend.

Please be in touch with any one of the clergy or staff if you'd like to baptism to be in your future of that of your child. The earlier you contact us, the better. Bear in mind that we can do a baptism at any of the services, either Saturday at 5 p.m. or the Sunday services, 8 a.m., 9:15 a.m. or 11 a.m. It is best to be baptized at the service which you regularly attend so that the community who promises to support you in keeping the baptismal promises is the community that will see you or your child regularly.

Expansion of the Memorial Garden --

No "No Vacancy" Signs

Our Bell Tower Memorial Garden was established with the purpose that, for little or no cost, people associated with the life of St. Martin's Church could have their ashes committed to the ground or sprinkled in a holy place that would remain at the heart of the community. With that history in mind, several years ago, Gary Osborn, then on the vestry, articulated a value for us all when he said, "We can't hang a "No Vacancy" sign out in the Memorial Garden." Gary said this prophetic statement as we were facing the possibility of running out of places for new graves.

Thanks to the leadership of your current vestry and the considerable talents of Cliff and Jean Dickey, Gina Clayton and Bonnie Klem, we have begun the expansion of the memorial garden, into the "Peace Garden," behind the Zigzag education building.

Framed by the original Bell Tower and the steps leading to La Tienda, the Peace Garden now offers a Common Committal Ground

(CCG) artfully decorated with succulent plants. By early November, pavers will be laid around the CCG, which will create a patio-like area where people will be able to stand when we do a committal ceremony. In addition, individual plots are planned for the area around the patio. These actions will give us the ability to continue to do Christian burial of ashes, according to the rite in the Book of Common Prayer, indefinitely.

This expansion was begun with restricted funds (specially purposed) from the Shelley Lake Memorial Fund and other memorial gifts. We seek to fund the rest of the project, which will cost no more than \$6,000. The vestry and finance committee encourage gifts in memory of specific loves ones, by anyone interested in doing so, to help pay for the remaining costs. Loved ones will be memorialized on a simple bronze plaque, to be placed on the Common Committal Ground wall, similar to the plaques installed on the wooden pillars of the Bell Tower Memorial. Gifts may be made by sending a check for any amount greater than \$100 to our office, payable to: St. Martin's Episcopal Church, memo line: Mem. Expansion, with an attached note specifying the name of the person to be memorialized (first, middle initial, last name) and the year of birth and the year of death. 



To Whom Can You Turn?

Every person encounters difficult patches in life, for various reasons. Sometimes, it might be difficult to thinking through a decision that has to be made. At other times, one needs counsel in dealing with a complicated family relationship. Yet other times, one may feel overwhelmed with the task at hand. Many times, habits that have served a person well for a lifetime now are causing problems. No matter what difficulty is confronting you, you have a helpful person you can turn to. St. Martin's Church is a partner church with the Peninsula Pastoral Counseling Center (PPCC). PPCC's Williamsburg office is in the Office Park directly above St. Martin's. In addition to accepting many insurances, PPCC offers self-pay options and a pay-as-you're able option. In addition, reduced rate or free counseling is available because St. Martin's has a "Pastor's Fund" with PPCC, from which your counseling fees can be paid. GOD'S STORY IS MY STORY

St. Martin's Sunday School for All Ages

The 2013-2014 school year will continue to implement St. Martin's new way of doing Formation for all ages. The emphasis will be on God's Story is My Story. During the academic year eight Bible stories will be told on one Sunday and then re-told three more times the following three Sundays in various age-appropriate ways and engaging all learning types and preferences. 


Get ready for a Bible Marathon! Rev'd Clay will be leading a seminar offering tips for diving into Holy Scripture. The Opening the Bible class will explore the history of the development of the Scriptures that make up the Canon of the Bible. We will also explore the difference and the histories of the translations that are available to us and their impact on theology. We had a wonderful time taking this journey last year and to make it more accessible to all of our parishioners we will hold one class at **2:00pm on December 5th and a second at <u>5:30pm</u> in the choir room of St. Martin's Episcopal Church.**

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a distance-learning program offered to lay people by the School of Theology at the University of the South in Sewanee, TN. St. Martin's offers this program on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00pm and it's held in Miles Hall. Seminar members systematically go through the Old Testament, New Testament, Church History and Theology over a four year period. The group runs from the last Tuesday in September through the beginning of June with breaks for Christmas and Easter. Seminar members



also experience something called Theological Reflection. This is an exceptionally useful tool to employ when faced with an unusual situation or when needing to make a difficult decision. The method trains one to reflection the pros and cons of a solution or decision in comparison to Biblical examples and reflection on the thoughts and feelings of the Biblical personalities in the example. The result of such an exercise is always illuminating. If you are a person with more questions about faith and God than you have answers, then this course is for you. The awakening of members to their own spirituality and the understanding of ministry are but two of the glowing outcomes of this course.


Welcome Visitors, Inquirers and New Members

July Treasurer's Report

July revenues were under budget by \$7,890, and expenses were under budget by \$1,825. As a result, NET for the month was under budget by \$6,065 as shown below.

Overall, it was a tough month, but we are not dropping as far behind as we have in the past.

On a YTD basis, revenues are under budget by \$8,839, compared to a shortfall of \$949 in June. Expenses are under budget by \$9,127, making our YTD Net over budget by \$288:

July was definitely a small dip, but three points show the strength of our financial position, including:

- 1. Pledges and Non-Pledge Contributions together are over budget by \$4,224
- 2. None of the funds that were planned to be provided by From Restricted Funds have been drawn down.
- 3. Expenses are under control and \$9.1 under budget YTD.




